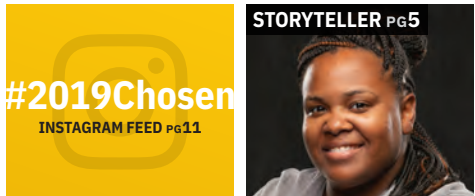

During Camporee, Derrick Ventour (a volunteer from the New Life Planeteers Pathfinder Club from the Northeastern Conference, Atlantic Union) happened to meet up with Theresa Quisenberry (director of the Phoenix South Mountain Eagles Club from the Arizona Conference, Pacific Union) while pin trading.

The two of them met a Pathfinder from Kenya and asked him if he had pins to trade. He said no so they went back to his camp to find a pin to trade. He led them to the campsite of the Flying Marines Pathfinder Club from Nairobi, Kenya. There Derrick and Theresa met the director of the Flying

Marines, Eva Boi, and started to learn more about their club.

All of the Flying Marines Pathfinder Club members are graciously being hosted by the Rockville Disciples from Potomac Conference, Columbia Union. “We registered one of the highest numbers (165) for this camporee,” says Opere Joel, one of the elders and previous director for the Flying Marines. “We thank

God for the CYE and the tremendous support they gave us in the registration and communication process.”

Even though they registered 165 people, only 136 were able to get visas to attend. 102 of them are Pathfinders and the rest are staff or adult parents who are providing support. Back in Kenya, the Flying Marines Pathfinder Club actually has 250 registered Path-

A Memorable Camporee

Joann Furbert has been to every camporee since Dare to Care in 1994, and was planning to make this camporee her last. She usually spends her days at camporee teaching the Cats honor, but this

camporee was going to be different—she was planning to just have fun. However, in late August 2018 Joann was told she would need a kidney transplant because she was in the end stages of renal failure.

After hearing this news, Joann planned to have her son donate to her but soon realized that he could not donate to anyone. Miraculously, within two weeks she got another donor and was told she could

have it before Christmas with some restrictions as to where the surgery would take place.

“It was all about following the kidney. I had already bought my ticket to camporee and the timeline for transplant and for me to attend camporee was not looking good. So I started stressing and planning. God told me to tell the donor no. I waited for three days than finally submitted to God and called the donor

to thank him and tell him no. The very next day I got another donor who was the exact same blood type as me,” Joann explains. “God was working on my behalf before I even knew it. I am told it is not likely to get three living donors in the space of two months.”

Joann has had this condition for 19 years. She changed her diet and her kid-

ney function went from 19.5 to 23 percent. Because of this, she didn’t need to have a kidney transplant and is now on the waiting list in an inactive state. If her kidney function drops below 10% she has a living donor who has agreed to give her a kidney.

After making another change in her diet, Joann’s kidney function has gone up to 27%. She feels blessed because this is almost where she started out 19 years ago.

“I finally get to enjoy a camporee, go to the air museum, participate in community service, see some old friends and do my favorite activity—pin trading. I want to break my record of getting more than 250 pins,” she says.

Safety and Main Stage Seating Tips

1. Have at least one adult at your campsite at all times.
2. Adults should accompany Pathfinders at all times.
3. When saving seats at the Nighttime Program arena, remember the rule of: seat one and save one. Only one person can save one seat for one other person. Do not leave your seating unattended. All unattended items left will be taken to Lost and Found or thrown away. Portable chairs are strongly recommended. People on tarps cannot see as well and take up a lot of space.

finders. Their large numbers are due in part to glowing reports from their 38 Pathfinders who were able to attend the Forever Faithful Camporee in 2014. Back in Kenya, the Flying Marines Pathfinders are very involved in Bible Skills training. They have a yearly evangelistic series where the Pathfinders go to unreached lands in Kenya and hold five- to ten-day seminars. These meetings have led to numerous baptisms and four church plants. The Flying Marines are also very interested in music. When Derrick and Theresa asked Eva what they teach their Pathfinders, Eva told them that they have a music section but

no instruments. This sparked Derrick’s and Theresa’s interest. “I was impressed that if we could get the word out and tell their story that the Pathfinder community could help with the funds,” explains Theresa. “We know everyone made sacrifices to get here but God impressed me and Derrick to help them get some funds. Reusable Camping Equipment & Leftover Food Items

If you have attended past camporees, you may have seen a large number of tents, chairs, sleeping bags, etc. in or near the dumpsters at the end of event. We are hoping to change that this year!

Because many clubs pre-order and pick up their gear in Oshkosh, they are unable to take it with them when they return home. If your club is one of those, please consider donating it by placing it at one of the designated collection sites. Plans are being made to have enclosed trailers on the grounds to receive any reusable camping gear, which will then be donated. Some will be given to homeless/street ministries in the area, and some to the group that will be going to Cuba to help organize Pathfinder clubs there. If you know your club will be leaving camping gear, please email Becky (beckyz1228@gmail.com) with information regarding what you will be donating, and the quantity. This will help facilitate plans for adequate collection sites on the grounds. Leftover food items will also be collected and can be dropped off at the

same collection sites. Food collected will be sorted and distributed to area food pantries. This is a great way to bless others as you prepare to leave Oshkosh. **Equipment accepted:** Camping gear such as tents, shelters, sleeping bags, chairs, coolers, etc. **Non-perishable food items accepted:** Canned or boxed food, produce such as potatoes, watermelon, unopened bread products, juice boxes, water bottles, etc. **Items NOT ACCEPTED:** We will not accept any open/unsealed food items, such as milk, bread, etc., or broken equipment.

Collection sites, days & times:

- Sites:** One located near the International Village, and the other near the South gate. These trailers will be on-site all week.
- Days:** Collections received on Saturday and Sunday
- Times:** Open at 2 p.m. on Saturday and then continuously through Sunday afternoon.

She likes showing how mathematics can be fun, useful and interesting. “I love being able to work with students so they can see how to utilize math in their lives and not be afraid of it. I particularly love working with students who have not seen success in math before,” she says.

Born and raised in Cincinnati, Ohio, Melissa is part of the “Fab 5” with four other siblings. Currently, she and one of her sisters are the only two who live in Cincinnati. They enjoy empowering urban students to learn and thrive.

Melissa’s only experience with Pathfinders was briefly in her early teens, that is until she became a staff member for the 2014 Camporee. She loves theater in general and has acted in short skits, improv and social justice mini pieces for churches and schools.

In 2014, co-director Heidi Littel encouraged Melissa to audition for the next camporee drama. When the roles were announced, Melissa actually auditioned specifically for the storyteller and that was what she was praying for. “I may be one of the few that was looking for a very specific role,” she explains. “I was actually out of the country when Heidi called and told me I got the part. I was very excited and felt incredibly blessed.”

Getting to know the other cast members has been one of the most enjoyable parts of her involvement in the play. A lot of Melissa’s lines aren’t dialogue so she acts as a bridge to bring the story together.

She says, “Seeing the passion and creativity of these awesome people that God has brought together has really been the best. We are all so different with different interests and hobbies, but I have learned a lot from them and enjoy working with them.”

Melissa considers her role as that of an inside/outside character, telling the story to the audience while also being a first-person observer to what’s happening. She hopes that the story will help Pathfinders understand that God has a plan for everyone and to see all the ways that He reaches out to each of us.

Melissa enjoys learning new things, traveling, running/walking, reading and being with her family. Her favorite quote is “Treasure this day and treasure yourself. Truly, neither will ever happen again,” by Ray Bradbury.

This is **Pam Krueger's** fourth and final Camporee as a medical coordinator. In 2003, Pam's youngest daughter was attending Andrews University and had a conversation with Ron Whitehead. He told her that he needed a nurse to manage the medical building at Camporee and she quickly replied: "My mom can do that." Pam was contacted and she said yes without knowing what magnitude of services would be needed.

Pam has found each Camporee to be a learning experience. She takes notes and draws pictures to make it even better and more efficient for the next time. Pam stated, "CYE leadership has been extremely supportive and worked very closely with me to meet the needs of the medical team and those we serve."

Her favorite part of the role is the amazing people who volunteer their time and talents to provide medical services to those in need. Their first mission is to share the love of Jesus as well as meet

the physical needs of those they serve. When asked to share what a typical day might be like, Pam responded: "There is not a typical day. Every day is different with different people and different needs. Every day is an opportunity to share Jesus with someone. It is typical for us to pray with our patients, to hug them, and encourage them. It is typical to be busy, to laugh, to work hard, and to be tired at the end of the day. It is typical to have sore feet and to start and end the day with smiles and Jesus in our hearts. We huddle multiple times during the day to have worship and pray and to share the highlights of the shift."

Pam's favorite time at Camporee actually occurred on Thursday, April 15, when she witnessed the excitement and amazement in the eyes of her grandson Riley and his friend Nathan, who are experiencing Camporee for the very first time. "It brought a new freshness to how awesome this event truly is. Equally as favorite are the lifelong friendships that are made that last a lifetime and into eternity," she says.

Even though Pam will no longer be working as a medical volunteer, she plans to return in 2024 as the cook for the Wisconsin Valley Falcons.

"We love what we do," Pam says on behalf of the medical team, "and I am truly honored to have worked with hundreds of dedicated medical volunteers who each have the primary mission in life to restore physical and mental health with Jesus leading the way. Thank you for this amazing experience. I pray that the next Camporee will be in Heaven."

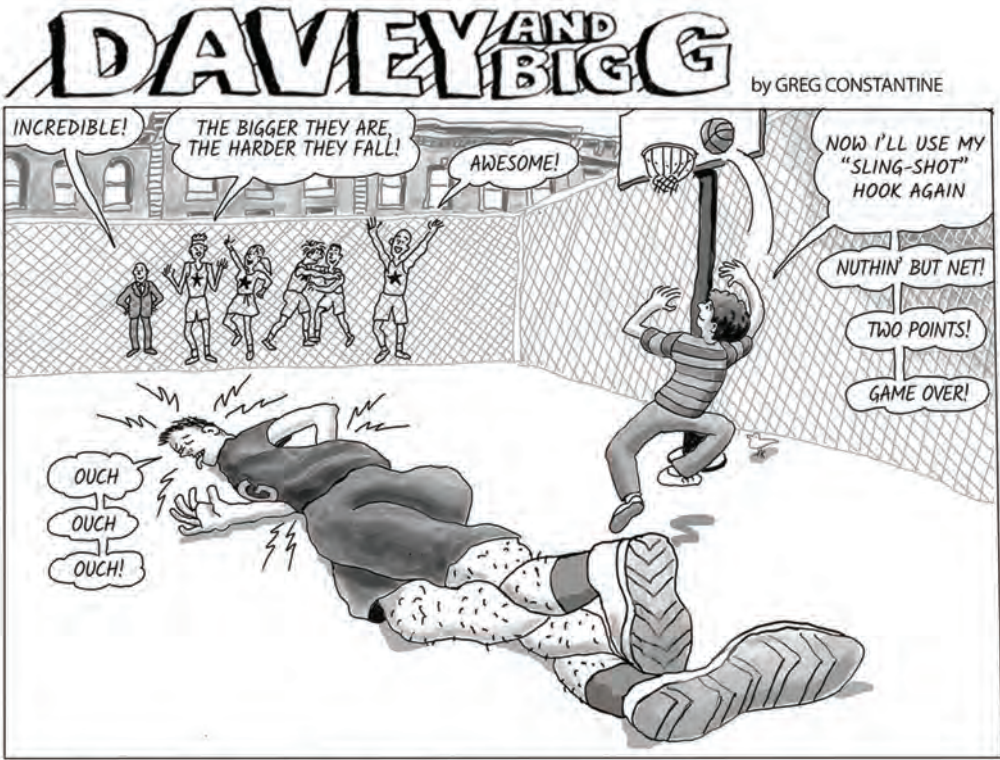

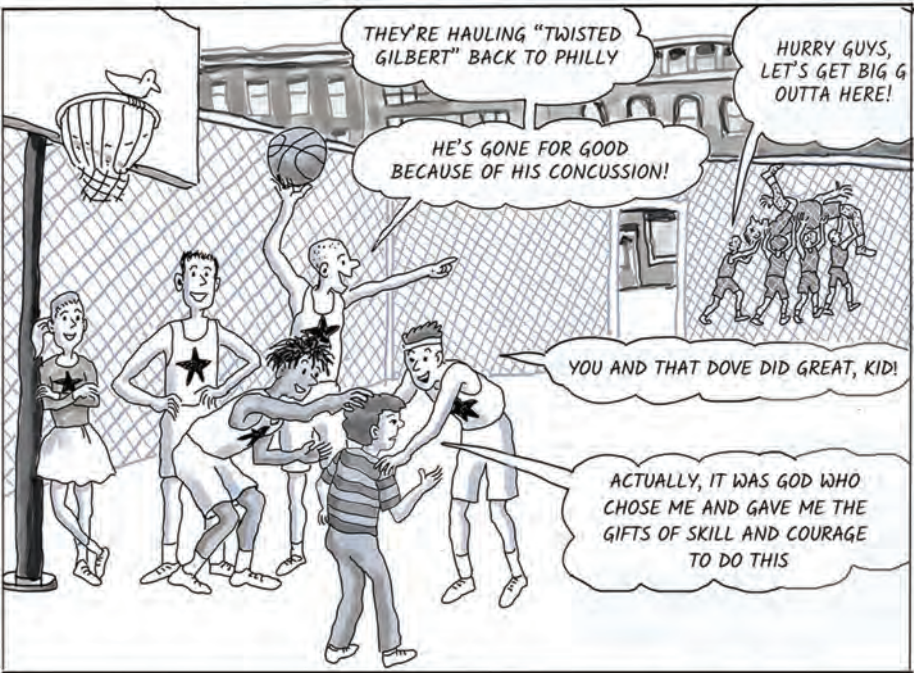

First Camporee Community Clinic

On Thursday, August 15, volunteers provided free vision and dental services at a community clinic in Oshkosh, Wisconsin, for the first time in Camporee history. There were approximately 30 volunteers who helped with everything from setting up the clinic on Wednesday afternoon and with the clinic itself on Thursday from 9 a.m. to 2 p.m. These volunteers included Pathfinders, TLT's, club sponsors and local church members.

Those at the clinic provided dental exams, x-rays, tooth extractions and eye exams along with

prescription glasses for those who needed them. They also provided accounting services and massages. At the end of the day, the clinic served approximately 60 people.

The goal of this clinic was to give back to the local community. "Our desire for this clinic was to involve our Pathfinders in a hands-on service project," explains Randy Griffin, one of the clinic organizers. "We also wanted to show the community that we care for them because we love Jesus!"

Many of the people who went to the clinic expressed their gratitude for the services that were being offered. "We are humbled and blessed to know that we were able to help them," Randy says.

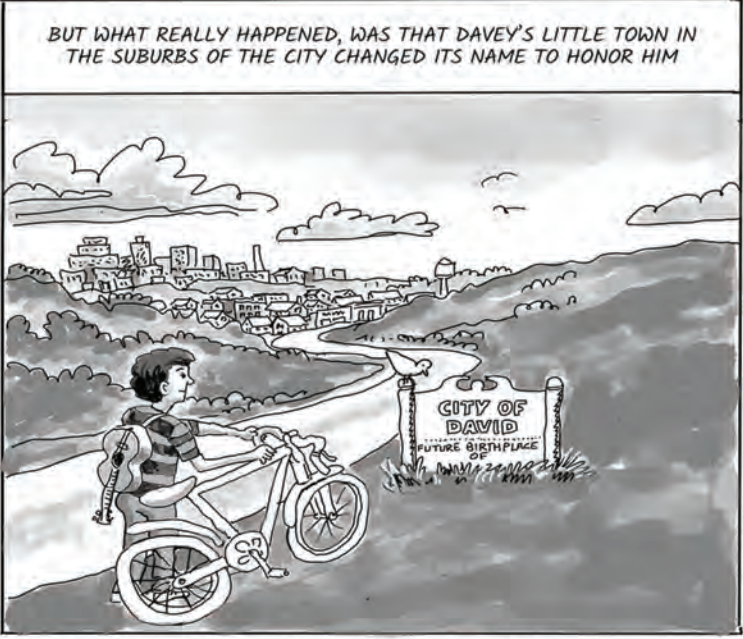

While there a friend of hers introduced Anna to a Nepalese family. Anna decided to move into their neighborhood and she quickly became friends with the young people. That group decided they wanted to do something to make a difference for their refugee friends.

In 2014, Anna took this small group of young people to the Forever Faithful Camporee where they became even more excited about Pathfinders. Then, Anna met Anne Wham, a retired Pathfinder director who took interest in the possibility of starting a club. They met for a brainstorming session and God has opened doors for them ever since.

In October of 2017 Anna and Anne started the New Change for Youth (NC4Y) in Kansas City, Kansas. Their first meeting started with 26 kids in the basement of an inner-city Lutheran church. Since then the Iowa/Missouri Conference has adopted NC4Y as an official Pathfinder Club.

"God orchestrated a whole raft of circumstances that made it possible to start a club," explains Anne.

"We now have a staff of young adult volunteers with language skills in Nepali, Swahili, Burmese and Spanish."

NC4Y now has a total of 54 Pathfinders in their club. Their Pathfinders and staff are from Nepal, Congo, Uganda, Tanzania, Thailand, Myanmar, Kenya, Mexico, Indonesia, Syria and the U.S.A.

NC4Y wanted to come to Camporee since the very beginning but they had no funding and no church. They created a box that said "You can make change" with a slot on top where kids could put money. But they knew that wouldn't get them to Oshkosh. In an attempt to raise more money, they held a soccer tournament that

several area Pathfinder clubs helped to support. Sadly, this didn't help them raise enough. "Just when all seemed hopeless, God sent a generous donor associated with AdventHealth who provided the funding for us to purchase tickets and equipment," Anne says. "Every step has been a miracle—funding, the use of a bus and a bus driver from Sunnydale Adventist Academy, a kitchen crew of volunteers and more. This is a God thing!"

Now that they are at Camporee the NC4Y Pathfinders have been staying busy. They had plans to go on Young Eagle flights and to run in the 5k as a club. For NC4Y Pathfinder, Nir Darjee, her favorite thing has been watching the drama productions at the nighttime programs.

Pathfinder Shabyata Biswa says, "What I enjoy about Camporee is that we are the first Nepali people to be here and we've never experienced something like this before. Everything has been fun so far."

"I like seeing so many people from so many places," says Asmita Sinchuri. "When they speak their languages it's just so fun. And it's a good experience."
